Fittingly we now move from Saigon to a famous track that leads to the city. Our enemy at the time used this track to infiltrate the City of Saigon where the Australian's had their Headquarters. This next member helped stop this insurgence.







Trooper John Thomas Ockwell

Royal Australian Armoured Corp

1967-1968 Tour of Duty with 3rd Cavalry Regiment South Vietnam 26/11/1967 to 14/08/1968

(Conversation with John Ockwell)

John was Born in Lilydale around the Yarra Valley area. He shared the home with four sisters and 2 brothers. Born on the 29 May 1946 to Harold, his father and Kate Emily Ellen Powell, his mother. (Just as a side note) Kate Powell is a descendent of Lord Robert Baden Powell founder of the scouts and along with his sister, founder of the girl guide/girl scout's movement, worldwide.

At the age of 16 years old John had bush fires rip through the Woori Yallock area. When the family had evacuated John and one of his sisters went back to try and back burn around the home but everything was out of control. They both ran into the river nearby to save their own lives. Tragically John's Uncle Les and Aunty Linda were heading from their home of danger to the safety of the Woori Yallock township. They never made it to town, and even worse they had two of their grandchildren with them.

John's Dad Harold was a champion at every sport he put his hands to. He was into every sport going in the town. Boxing, Cricket and Football. His accolades were that good that the Town named the local Park after him.

John's first job at 18 years of age was assistant paymaster for the Metropolitan Board of Works. This job required John to travel all over the Melbourne area distributing pay packets to the water catchment workers. They travelled with four crew, two were armed security and the other two were the pay representatives. They were even required to enter Pentridge Prison where they had staff working. When they entered Pentridge the crooks would heckle, jeer and whistle at them, John found this fairly unnerving.

John went for his license at the local police station, the cop knew he lived on a farm and told him to drive around the block, when they got back to the station John said we haven't parked or done a U-turn the copper told him that he hasn't got time to mess around all day, so John took the hint.

John has spent some time researching two of his uncles who both fought in the Great War in Europe. Charlie and Alfred were both fighting in the same Unit on the Western Front around France. The Battle of Passchendaele (Third Battle of Ypres) Belgium, which ran from 31 July to 10 November 1917, Sadly, Charlie was killed in action on the 04 October and less than a week later Alfred was also killed in action, that date being 09 November 1917. John has made a number of trips over to Europe to pay his respects.

John was called up for national service in September 1966 and was happy to oblige. So off to Puckapunyal he went. John's cousin was also conducting his basic training at the same time so they would challenge each other on the running track for a bit of fun. Footy season hadn't long finished so John found that the basic training was not so rigorous. After John finished his 10 weeks of training he stayed on at Pucka because the School of Armour was also on the Puckapunyal Base. This is where John completed his Armoured Personal Carrier (APC) course

Now, John was transferred to Wacol in Queensland where he would stay for the next 3-4 months. Attached to 2nd Cavalry Regiment, John was now waiting to be assigned to a unit permanently. Whilst waiting, he helped out umpiring on a number of Exercises in Shell Water Bay. The Units participating in these Exercises were honing their skills before deployment to South Vietnam. At the end of John's stint in Wacol he was assigned to the 3rd Cavalry Regiment (3 Cav) back at Puckapunyal.

Pre deployment training at Canungra was the last chance to hone the Units skills before Operations. The conditions at Cunungra training Base are not dissimilar to the terrain in Vietnam. Now John was on foot playing infantry tactics.

John was in charge of his section playing enemy against the 1st Royal Australian Regiment (1 RAR). The 1 RAR boys had just returned from Vietnam and were basically sharpening their skills. John's section walked straight into the 1 RAR platoon and the pretend battle was on. John sent his section back for re enforcements while he fired the odd shot to keep their heads down. Little did John know that one of them snuck up behind him and tapped him on the should, he asked John if he wanted to play dead or be captured, John said "be captured".

They took him back to their base camp and fed him better than what he was getting fed from his own side. John had a good night's sleep and was still in bed when John's own troops put in the final assault on 1 RAR early in the morning.

After Cunungra, John along with the rest of the 3 Cav boys were sent to Holsworthy Barracks in Sydney to await deployment. Returning soldiers from Vietnam would be replaced by fresh newbies and those soldiers who would be on a 2nd or 3rd tour of Vietnam. Sometimes they would be replacing wounded or dead soldiers, from what I have been able to work out each soldier in South Vietnam knew who their replacement would be. Like a one for one deal.

Courtesy of Qantas the next contingent of soldiers were sent to South East Asia. This would be a mixture of soldiers with varying talents e.g. cooks, infantrymen, artillerymen, Medics and even padre's, the list goes on. On John's flight he had 13 others from 3 Cav and they landed at Tan Son Airport in South Vietnam.

The intelligence prior to leaving was that if you see anyone wearing black riding a pushbike, they were Viet Gong (the Enemy). When they landed, John quickly realised that most of the locals were wearing exactly that (poor intel).

The next day John flew by C-123 (Caribou) to Nui Dat which was where the Australian Task Force was located. This was the main base for the Australian Army and also where 3 Cav was stationed.

Now that John was at home base, he was assigned his APC (Armoured Personnel Carrier) and crew commander. Vehicle call sign 3 1 Alfa for radio communication purposes meaning, troop 3, section 1 and Alfa being the lead vehicle most of the time. Each APC can carry 11 persons in the back and has a permanent crew of two, being the Crew Commander and Driver. On top of the APC, you had either two 30 calibre machine guns or one 50 calibre machine gun. Most soldiers preferred the 50 Cal as it had more hitting power and was also more reliable. The main function of the APC's is still to this day, to transport troops to and from Operations in the field. Also, to support the infantry in battle with heavy machine gun support and protect the same soldiers from enemy fire.

The biggest dangers were firstly landmines that could be detonated by downward pressure or remotely controlled for ambush purposes, this was bad news for the driver who sits down low in the vehicle. Secondly was the use of Rocket Propelled Grenades (RPG) that could penetrate the side of the APC.

John's troop was part of every Operation whilst he was in Country. The two major battles that John was part of were The Tet Offensive and The Battle of Coral/Balmoral which was protecting Saigon along the Ho Chi Ming Trail. The Tet Offensive took place in 1968 and the objective was for the Viet Cong to capture every major city in Vietnam, this was partially

successful but after many confrontations with the Viet Cong they were eventually pushed back.

The Second battle was a 6-week long event, this was where the Viet Cong used the Ho Chi Ming Trail to infiltrate Saigon. To stop them the Australian Forces set up two Fire Support Bases (large contingent of Australian Forces) one was called Balmoral and the other was called Coral.

The 1st Offensive took place at the Balmoral FSB. The first night they set up camp was the night they were hit by Regular North Vietnamese Soldiers (RNVS). The RNVS were hell bent on wiping out the Australian base, and in doing so overran the Artillery Guns killing a number of soldiers. The Gunners did manage to remove their firing pins so the RNVS couldn't use them against the remainder of the camp. Eventually the Aussies repelled the attack by shear force and the RNVS were pushed back out of the base.

The 2nd Offensive that John was involved in took place on the Coral FSB. The RNVS sent Rocket Propelled Grenades and mortar shells on their position over many nights. On the night of the attack the RNVS laid a pipe like bomb (Bangalore Torpedo) over the concertina wire to blow it out the way. This was their entry into the FSB, from here they partly overran the base, things were frantic. After this initial assault the Coral FSB gained the upper hand and repelled the attack. The 3 Cav boys and the rest of the FSB pursued the RNVS for days, eventually the area was cleared of any enemy activity.

One of the main reasons that the Coral and Balmoral Bases were successful was the use of the Centurian tanks. Among the Centurian Tanks arsenal was the use of canister shots. These shots filled the air with 100's of pieces of small lead, a bit like what a claymore can do. This was used at both FSB's during their offensives to great effect. Also, John was part of a number of minor skirmishes in different areas of operation throughout his tour. Eventually John's tour of Vietnam had come to an end, he returned home to Australia on the 14 Aug 1968.

The Battle of Coral/Balmoral was by far Australia's largest, longest, bloodiest battle involving more soldiers of both forces, and suffering more casualties than any other battle of the Vietnam War.

When John returned home, he got the same treatment as all the other returned Vietnam Veteran's, rejection and names like baby killer. He went bush for a few weeks to clear his head. John then started working for Esso conducting clerical work for the oil riggers working off shore. After this he went through different jobs during the 70's until he realised that he had Post Traumatic Syndrome. At this point John was married to Jenny with two young children.

Now moving into the 80's John joined Mobil Oil and worked his way up to Area Manager of the Gippsland & South NSW Coastal Areas. He held this position until 1986. Now John branched out and bought his own service station in Bairnsdale, he changed the brand name form BP to Mobil and ran this for 11 years.

John then worked for the local Traralgon Agency as the Area Manager of the service stations; this is when John hit the wall. Officially Diagnosed with PTSD, John spent the next 6 weeks in the Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital. John said it was a great help to go through the rehabilitation program and to get his life back on track. John was awarded Total Permanent Impairment (TPI) in 1997.

The effects of war certainly haven't slowed John down as a whole. He has been very active on numerous committees, also heading up some of these organisations as well.
