Wild and Windy at Queenscliff

Marcus and Roy took the trip down to Queenscliff for the commemorative service of the HMAS Goorangai. This was the same trip that they did last year.

HMAS Goorangai was a 223-ton auxiliary minesweeper of the Royal Australian Navy. She was built in 1919 for the Government of New South Wales, then sold in 1926 to the fishing company Cam & Sons. The trawler was requisitioned for military service following the outbreak of World War II, it was then converted into a minesweeper and assigned to Melbourne. She was sunk in an accident/collision with MV Duntroon in 1940.

On the night of the 20^{th of} November 1940, Goorangai was crossing the mouth of Port Phillip Bay to anchor at Portsea for the night. The minesweeper was sailing under "brown out" conditions with minimal lighting. At 2037 hrs, MV Duntroon, en route to Sydney, emerged from Port Phillip Bay and cut Goorangai in two.

The small auxiliary sank within a minute, taking all 24 personnel aboard with her. Only six bodies were recovered, one of which couldn't be identified. Goorangai and her ship's company were the RAN's first loss in World War II, and the RAN 's first surface ship ever to be sunk while in service.







holiday break.







Enlistment: 03 Jan 1942

Discharged: 02 Sep 1946







Born and bred in Batesford, Victoria, Jack was a man of the land. Born to Edward Percival Carroll and Esther Victoria Carroll nee Smith on the 06th Sep 1923.

At the spritely age of 16 Jack joined the Air Training Corps which would have assisted him in becoming an Air Crew, Wireless-Air Gunner in the R.A.A.F. As there were no vacancies at the time, and anxious to get into one of the services, he enlisted in the C.M.F. (Citizen Military Forces) as a volunteer in 1941 at the age of 18 years old, he then transferred to the A.I.F. (Australian Imperial Forces) and was posted to the 5th Australian Troop Company R.A.E. No 3 Platoon.

After completing training in Victoria, NSW and then QLD Jack's Unit was as ready as they could be. But, just prior to leaving for overseas deployment Jack had a surprise, "I had walked past many tents on the night before departure and as I passed one particular tent, I heard coughing, and I said that sounds like my brother Laurie." Sure, enough that's who it was, the brothers were able to spend the last night together before both embarking on overseas service. Jack's Unit was headed for Milne Bay, Lae and Madang in New Guinea. During this time Jack was promoted to Corporal.

(After transcribing Jack's New Guinea diary, we have some firsthand accounts of life in a support Unit near the Japanese front around Milne Bay.)

New Guinea Dairy 1943-44



25th Mar- Townsville, one month Jungle Training and road making.

26th **Apr**- Townsville, boarded the SS Taroona (transport ship) for New Guinea, escorted by HMAS Vendetta (Destroyer).

28th Apr- Arrived at Milne Bay at 4pm.

03rd May- Heavy rain set in "mud & water everywhere".

06th **May**-Taroona stuck in mud bank in bay, towed off by Destroyer, mail coming.

Jack one week after enlistment

10th **May**- At 6.50am Togo's come over and drop bombs around the bay area. We took cover in good order, up to knees in mud and water. Heavy barrage put up, but bombers sneak off into the clouds. On roof tops with tar and malthoid (bituminous flashing).

12th **May**- Togo over at 10.00am today, no bombs dropped, Kitty Hawk chased them off. Worked mixing cement.

14th **May**- Started carrying gravel in new trucks.

19th May- Driving day & night ceaselessly, engine started 6am on the 17th and was and was not until 6pm on the night of the 19th that I finished. Tired, sick in the stomach & toothache.



21st May- Last night air raid, losses totalling, 1 x Kitty lost, 1 x petrol dump set ablaze and destroyed on ship. Togo's bomber downed by A.A. (antiaircraft).

22nd **May**- Night very uncertain, coastal artillery going at night. Carting more gravel. Alert alarms off and on all day.

23rd May- Had half hour alarm while at the pictures. Togo, he didn't give any trouble though. Heavy air traffic throughout day, planes taking off every few minutes.

26th **May**- Very busy carting gravel, slipped over bank into mud & tipped truck over, not much damage. Hell of a fight righted her with winch, very relieved.

Jun 02nd- Quiet and still on the water. Building ramp & workshop. Mail arriving every second day. Very cloudy at night, no moon, no Togo. Hauling logs with Caterpillar Tractor.

Jun13th- Sunday, Work today. Trucks unloaded spent morning on truck maintenance. Very tired 3 and a half hours of heavy sleep in 36 hours. Recce plane over this morning, moon getting full, plenty of mail.



Jun19th- Went to pictures at 10 o'clock, had an alert while driving home, good moon, no lights. Spitfires arrive.

Jun 25th- Fresh arrival of carrots, parsnips, onions, potatoes and apples. It's great after tinned stuff. Rained since 22nd, eased off a bit.

Jun 27th- Air Cobras (fighter planes) arrive, Spitfires gone. No raids, cloudy weather, ceiling zero.

Jun 29th - Saw General McArthur today, followed his car.

Jul 01st- General McArthur leaves in an escort of 12 fighters.

Jul 10th- Rumour from Warwick Hospital that the 5th Army has been badly cut about in action & is returning to Aussie. That accounts for my headache, still raining.

Jul 15th- Still raining heavily, no mail for a week. Food still rotten. Breakfast, grated biscuits followed by bully beef, meals a repetition.

Jul 31st- Had terrible cold but much better now. Still muddy & wet. 9th Div arrives in bay (advance guard).

Aug 02nd- Half dozen Malaria cases in hospital, others sick. Work too hard & too long. New American Thunderbolt dive bomber arrives.

Aug 09th- Sunday, Went for load of wood as punishment and rest day off. Kitty cracks up on ship this morning, blow up and pilot killed.

Aug 10^{th-} Two 9th Div trucks tipped over today, need to drive the N.G. way. Mail tonight, first for 10

days.

Aug 11th- Twelve months today since we left Melbourne

Aug 16th- Showery weather, night driving till 12 o'clock. Australian Boomerang fighter here.

Aug 22nd- Tremendous petrol blaze at Bipod Dump, hundreds of drums burned. Unit called out to make breaks in drums. Under control now but still burning. Estimated 140,000 gal destroyed.

Aug 28th- Very hot again, first mail & papers for 10 days. Maintenance on trucks this morning and afternoon. Spinal recreation, very nice indeed.

Sep 02nd- Still salvaging material & trucks from sunken Chinese ship in bay.

Sep 13th- Saw my first Jap plane in action, I was down at wharf and flew right over head. Shrapnel fell to close for my liking. Blazed away, excited but also frightened.

Sep 17th- Just arrived back from pictures & as I write, tracers 3.7 & 4.8's are blazing into the sky and shaking our huts. A beautiful sight with nine search lights and the gun flashes lighting up like daylight. No word as yet as to what is down.

Sep 26th- Sunday, worked in morning, went for a swim in sea in afternoon, then a 50-mile drive to Shinger Bay. Saw Jap invasion barges smashed, and place where 80 Jap marines are buried. Had drink of spring water from Cameron Springs.

Oct 06th- Half hour alert last night, went for swim in sea with Norm at 10.15 on the moonlight after duty, showery.

Oct 10th- Sunday, working today. Weather still cloudy & unsettled. One of Unit Tippers tipped over a bridge into creek fully loaded. Took three 9 Div winch & crane trucks. Another truck tipped over into creek where our own went only a better job this time.



Oct 15th- More rain & mud. An alert yesterday morning. Beaufort bomber caught fire in the air this afternoon, crashed and bombs exploded, killed crew of four.

Oct 26th- Heavy ack-ack tonight, terrific flashes. Weather still awful hot and dusty.

Nov 04th- Has been raining steadily since Sunday, bridges, roads flooded.

Nov 05th- Jap soldier captured near Bipod in jungle, first reported by natives.

Nov 18th-Received cake.

Dec 06th- Recce plane over at 10.30 this morning. Shrapnel falls very close to us, 5 of our fighters try to intercept but too late.

Dec 12th- Went to church in morning and rested for other part of day. Received parcel from Betty & postal from Joy.

Dec 14th- An alert at 2 0'clock in the morning, all clear. 3 o'clock submarine scare, heavy artillery & machine guns manoeuvring all night.

Dec 27th- Report of the Units movement soon, hope we move north. Steady rain last night & yesterday.

1944

Jan 02nd- Moved camp, now situated near sea. Good swimming & much healthier. Tojo 4am in bomb alley.

Jan 05th- Went to pictures, just got into bed and air raid sirens blasted. Terrible noise from ships in bay. Could hear the orders to the AA gunners alongside our camp. Raid 11 o'clock, all clear 12 o'clock.

Jan14th- Camp transformed to mud & slush after several inches of rain, still very heavy. Fresh potatoes, apples & mangoes.

A story that Jack did tell his son Ron was "driving with a sergeant and four fuzzy Wuzzies in the back of a truck, we headed into the jungle. One of the fuzzy Wuzzies yelled out JAC! The Sarg swore and said, if we see the enemy we should engage them (Unit Policy). The Sargeant got out of the vehicle and shot his side arm (pistol) into the air, Bang, Bang, Bang quickly got back into the vehicle and drove off". (They complied with Unit policy and more importantly lived to tell the tale. If there was one Jap then there would have been more not far away.)

Jan 27th- Light & heavy rain off & on since 20th. Shifted into huts from tents, nearly as cool as tents. Back to 100 miles a day driving now.

Jan 31st- Strong rumours, we will soon be going home or further north. Like it's one way or the other.

Feb 10th- Hauling logs at bridges, big strain on truck, finished weekend. Heavy rain set in during past three days. No mail for 10 days.

Feb 13th- Went for sea trip into China straights in Jap barge, had good time fishing, swimming, eating and fooling, landing at bow of coast.

Feb 18th- An alarm on all day and night, while I write this a plane has been shot down and is burning in the bay, terrific ack-ack.

Feb 27th- Another day off, on guard last night so am relaxing today with" The Term of his Natural Life" good book. Another batch of our chaps going home tonight.

Mar 15th & 16th- Painted truck light & dark green camouflage, looks like a new job. Weather hot again and no mail for a while now.

Mar 22nd- Rumours flying high regarding leaving M.Bay. Preparations being made by Unit. Saw good picture in the rain tonight, raining steadily now. (pictures are open air).

Apr 08th- Good Friday, day off. Went to service had sing song & then service Barge, busy tomorrow. Expected to be on mainland by 1st week of May. Ahn Chung fully raised, now just waiting for tug which is on its way from Australia. Many hundreds of planes used in invasion, excessive, very impressive.

Apr 14th- Americans taking over all anti- aircraft defences of Milne Bay. Maintenance under school supervision for last 3 days.

Apr 15th- Our movement order has had a sharp setback; don't think we will leave till July.

Apr 16th- Sunday, day off after 2hrs duty. Went for trip in afternoon to see sick mate in 110th C.C.S. (casualty clearing station). Talked to some American nurses, looked over Ahn Chung, food bad & no bread.

Apr 28th- 1 year today since we landed Mine Bay, half day holiday. Raining very heavily.

Apr 29th- 2 Big bridges washed away as yet, still raining. Cut off from ration supply, infantry training cancelled. Unit to build bridges quickly as possible. Exams today at T/School.

Apr 30th- Spent night guarding partly washed-out bridge, still raining at 1 inch an hr, 15 bridges damaged or washed away up till today. (Biggest storm in Pacific for two years).

May 01st- 3 bridges repaired so far, heavy work driving. Unit working 3 shifts, no bread, mail or rations. Largest Air Force Unit in Pacific totally destroyed.

May 21st- Sunday, work today again. Heavy rains yesterday & last night. Temporary box girder bridge washed away and waters still rising. One of our chaps killed last night, funeral today.

Saturday- Heavy rains again, on guard tonight. Mail scarce. Liberty ship smashed through repulse wharf (120ft). Terrible cold, feel miserable.

Jun 04th- Mail arrives by boat, 7 letters, still very wet. Rumours running strong about leaving here. Finished painted & checking truck, expect to loose them this week. Light rain all week, have a cold, not properly better yet. No mail for over a fortnight, think it being held up on mainland.

Jun 06th- Have just returned from picture show, very good. Plenty rain about but well worth it. Received news of invasion of Europe. Douglas & 4 airmen lost up mount.

Jun 10th- Has rained for 19 consecutive days & still going strong. Strong rumours about going south.

Jun 23rd – Advanced guard leaves here for Madang. I expect to be going on leave then follow rest of company north.

Jun 25th- Ahn Chung leaves by tug pulling early this morning. On guard last night, day off today. Lovely and sunny.

Jun 26th- Just received official orders to pack for Madang. Expect to be leaving tomorrow. Am on next draft for mainland.

Jun 27th- Movement order cancelled until further date. Rain again.

Jun 30th More boys leave for Madang aboard HMAS Bunderburg.

Jul 01st- Took truck to workshop for check, drivers still have their truck. Received parcel with wedding cake & mail. Weather not so wet.

Jul 13th- Have just returned from transporting our chaps to docks. They went aboard Destroyer Vendetta for Madang. Only a few left in Milne Bay. Going home soon, I think.

Jul 23rd- Sunday, raining all week, no mail for a while. Just received news of home leave, packing up today. Expect to go early in the week.

Jul 27th- At last, it has come. Came aboard Canberra a little after dawn, up at 4 o'clock underway at 10.35. Have cleaned sheets now and sleeping and resting.

Jul 29th- Saturday, land signalled early this morning. Cleared channel 1 o'clock now steaming down reef, expect to arrive Townsville after midday. Completed trip without being sick. Canberra rides like a sedan car. Anchored Townsville harbour for an hour at 2.30 pulled into wharf 4.30, disembarked at 6 o'clock. Entertainment at wharf for staging camp at Jalagee, 12 miles south of Townsville.

Jul 29th- Received fruit as we were coming off boat. Home comforts friendly girls, camp food good here. Surrounded by palm trees, no coconuts.

Jul 31st- Monday, arrived Kalinga near Brisbane, stayed night at staging camp.

Aug 01st- Moved into Brisbane, sightseeing 11.00am till 11.00pm Tues, Wed, Thur & Fri was sight-seeing.

(Jack spoke very highly of the Fuzzie Wuzzies that are native to New Guinea. We read about the Fuzzie Wuzzies in many campaigns that the Australian Troops were involved in. An invaluable asset at a time of great need.)

21st August 1944, Home

Jack was a very meticulous man as you can see by his dairy. He had also written down the distances to and from various o/s locations he had been to (should have been in intelligence).

After New Guinea, Jack was sent back to Australia on sick leave. A bout of dysentery and an injury from unloading the trucks earnt Jack a short break. Jack returned to his Unit in time to relieve the American troops in the Solomons Islands where he served until peace was declared.

Singapore Bay

After returning to Australia at the end of the war Jack then sailed on the Mercy Ship "Duntroon" to Singapore and Malaya with the 1st Australian Prisoner of War Recovery Group. Now assigned to a British Unit and driver to a British Officer. Jack would assist with the rapid return of prisoners from the 8th Division and civilians who were also caught up in the Japanese take over.

On the **13 Sep 1945** prisoners of war were released from Changi Prison Camp. They were evacuated from Singapore by the Australian Hospital Ship Manunda. This was the first Australian ship to arrive at Singapore after the surrender of the Japanese.



The British Officer wasn't impressed with Jack's well-worn Aussie uniform, so he sent Jack to their Quarter Master Store for a new British uniform.

Jack stayed on in Singapore until November that year and history tells us that great cruelty happened in Changi Prison. As a result of what Jack witnessed his path would eventually lead to helping Return Servicemen in various forms.

On completion of this task, he returned to Australia and transferred to the 1st Australian Army Ordinance Corps Tank and Vehicle Depot at Bandiana in Victoria. Here Jack was promoted to acting Sargeant in charge of a section where he spent the next nine months.

Jack was discharged on the 02nd Sep 1946 with 1700 days of service under his belt.

For all of Jacks' efforts and a lifetime of service to the community he earnt himself the OAM medal.

The Order of Australia is an Australian honour that recognises Australian citizens for outstanding achievements and services.

Jack was accompanied by his oldest daughter Heather and his only son Ron. This ceremony took place at Government House on the 9th Jun 2003.

- Received his 50-year Jewel from the Masonic Lodge on the 15 May 2004.
- Received his 70-year Jewel from the Masonic Lodge on the 15 May 2024.

Jack was a market Gardener his whole life and lived at Batesford the entire time with the exception World War 2 and the move to Cost House 8-10 years ago.

Ron tells me that even though Jack lived near the Batesford Pub he never went in there. He would wait until he was travelling into Geelong to attend the RSL.

The other reason Jack ventured into Geelong was to take his market produce to South Geelong. Jack's son Ron recalled the name Richardson's as the Fruit, Veg and Poultry Market that bought their produce and sold to the public.

On the courts of Batesford you could find 8 players at the local tennis club with 6 of them being a Carroll. That would be sisters, brothers and cousins.

Jack and Jean had three children with the oldest being Heather (Baxter) then Ron Carroll and June (Waight).

Before joining the Army at around the age of 18 years old Jack and his mates would gather at the bottom of Hyland St Fyansford. The aim from here was to see who could driving to the top of the street at McCurdy's Rd without changing gears. (If you know where the Fyansford Pub is and where McCurdy's Road is then you know it is a very steep incline).

From the bottom of the hill Jack and his mates would go through the gears as quickly as possible and see who could make it to the top of the hill in top gear. "A



dangerous feat if you stall on the way up". Jack would challenge this stunt in his yellow soft top Austin.

Also around the age of 18 Jack was a trend setter, he was happy to boast that he had 14-inch cuffs on his trousers, trendy back in the day.

Around 1963 Jack's daughter Heather was about 13 years old and she wanted to watch the Seekers on TV. Jack said, "we are not watching some pop group," Heather was

upset. Heather's Mum Jean said, "go on let her watch the Seekers," Jack conceded and sat with his arms folded and begrudgingly watched the show. By the end of the telecast Jack had been entertained and later took Jean, Heather and June to see them preform at the Sidney Myer Music Bowl in Melbourne (along with 80,000 other fans). Jack is still a fan of the Seekers, especially Judith Durham.
